How does it work?

Prizes include accessories and equipment to help our school travel actively.

The challenge is running from up to 21st March.




Year 6

We really enjoyed celebrating World Book Day yesterday - there were some great costumes and onesies! It was lovely to be able to share stories at the Story Cafe. Thank you to everyone who came to support this event.



The visit today by Children's author and illustrator, Laura Ellen Anderson's visit was great fun - lots of great tips on how to draw and on how to become an illustrator. Many pupils have loved her Amelia Fang and Rainbow Grey series.

In English, we started to plan and write a letter from RMS Carpathia. Our letters, written by the characters who were rescued in our stories, describe life aboard the ship RMS Carpathia which came to their rescue. We are loving our class book, "The Boy at the Back of the class," and we now know that the new boy in class, Ahmet, is actually a refugee and has escaped from a war.



In Geography, we have been learning about how migrants vary and looking at the difference between Temporary and Permanent Migration. We have been reading some Migrant case studies and looking at the push and pull factors of why they have moved to a new area.

Year 3

This week has flown and we have managed to fit so much in. Some of us have been preparing for our assembly next Thursday (3T).

We have continued investigating magnets in Science - looking and checking which objects that are magnetic or not. We also investigated how many paper clips a magnet hold!



In ICT the children have photographed, documented and filed their Art portfolios onto their Google drive. In DT we have started looking at pneumatics (a reminder that if your child has not brought in an egg box yet please send them in with one next week as we will need one).

We are continuing reading our class novel Bronte Tempestra which the children are thoroughly enjoying. The Stone Age era was completed this week in Humanities and the children are looking forward to the Geography topic of the Jurassic coast!



World book day/ story cafe was successful. Children were all dressed for reading and it was lovely to see so many adults reading with the children. Some children created their own character, writing their own mini story! We also have lots of new book marks!

Year 5

During World Book Day, it was great to see lots of children dressed up as their favourite characters. We spent time in the story café reading to each other and to the adults who came to join us – thank you so much to everyone that could attend.

Year 5 have been working on the fourth and final chapter of our sky ship adventure, this week we focused on describing a strange occurrence and building up suspense by using weather, time of day, scary details and rhetorical questions.

Author and illustrator Laura Ellen Anderson visited our school today, we had a great time learning about her books (Marnie Midnight, Amelia Fang, Rainbow Grey and Evil Emperor Penguin) as well as creating a wonderful illustration



The first method of separation we used was filtering. We used this to separate the salt water from the sand, rocks and metal. We chose this method because it would make it easier to separate the solids once the water was gone. The filter paper has tiny holes which means that liquids can pass through but solids can't. The filter paper split in our investigation but before it split it held the solids and let the liquid pass through.

In Science children discovered different methods of separation to separate various materials discovered on the beach – we used evaporation, filtering, decanting, sieving and magnetism.

We are still doing forest school. Please make sure children bring enough layers to be comfortable and dry, a spare set of socks as well as their school shoes.

It wasn't to be.... The boys have had a brilliant season so far and hoped a win would give them the league title. In an end to end game, filled with a few errors, TJS were disappointed to lose 3-1 to a well organised opposition.

They arrived at Ashmead, confident a victory could be achieved. From the kick off, our opponents were closing TJS down and driving forward.

A few changes were made to the starting seven, with illness keeping Inigo absent and Justine stepping in. Taylan was away on holiday, so Nicholas started up front with Mason waiting on the side lines, eager to be involved.

On another long grassed pitch (same for both teams), TJS tried to take control. In different parts of the pitch, individual battles were taking place. Strength, skill and determination on show.

Unfortunately, as much as TJS tried to break down the defence and shoot, our finishing wasn't there and the resilience of Ashmead stood strong. Moments after a TJS attack, Ashmead broke. Confusion in the defence allowed the attacker to shoot, 1-0 Ashmead.

More shots started to occur. Mason, Cory, Noah and Alfie shot towards goal- today it wasn't going to be their day.

The ball broke into the TJS half from a long kick. Their left winger fired in a shot, travelling to the top corner. Noah thought he was playing basketball and pushed it over the bar. What Parents & Educators Need to Know about TEKKEN 8

Thirty years after its debut on the original PlayStation, the Tekken franchise is back with its eighth mainstream instalment. A one-on-one fighting game series in the same vein as Street Fighter and Mortal Kombat, Tekken 8 can be commended for its relative lack of in-game purchases – but there's still plenty to consider in keeping young players safe from potential hazards.

WHAT ARE THE RISKS?

FUTURE SPENDING?
Tekken 8 comes a PEGI 16 rating, with the necessary rating in mind, occasional profanity and some profane options. The latter issue, however, is a little different to what you may expect from a modern game, as many high-profile releases, Tekken 8's content is off-accessible without spending any extra money. The exceptions are new characters, which will become available to purchase separately in the future.

COPYCAT RISK
With characters flying across the screen using a mixture of authentic and fantastical fighting styles, younger children and impressionable teens may find themselves tempted to copy their favourite characters or act out their epic fights in real life. This could easily amount to harmless fun – but could also easily lead to accidents, injury and distress if young gamers start actually landing blows.

VIOLENT GAMEPLAY
As a fighting game, Tekken 8's gameplay is heavily based on punching, kicking and throwing opponents around, while some characters' attacks occasionally involve weapons. Most of the violence is comparatively cartoonish in its execution and lacking in gore, but the fact remains that the action can involve entirely unprovoked intense combat and inflicting damage on an opponent.

FAMILY CONFLICT
Tekken 8's story mode, 'The Dark Awakener', focuses on two of the series' most important characters – Kazuya and Jin, a father and son who have been warring for years. The sight of two family members physically fighting each other may be hard to understand (and difficult to deal with) for some children – causing confusion and concern over why relatives would want to hurt one another.

RANKED ONLINE PLAY
Tekken 8 features an array of online modes – most notably its 'Ranked' section, where players battle to reach the top spot of a worldwide leaderboard. Many players will dedicate significant amounts of time to practising and while the challenge can be fun – some of these matches can get extremely competitive. Children could become obsessed with climbing the rankings and dedicate an unhealthy amount of time to the game or grow angry if they end up on a losing streak.

ONLINE CONTACT
Tekken 8 doesn't offer voice chat by default, but a player's platform ID is visible (such as their PSN or Xbox gamertag). If you play online, you can, therefore, reach out and message if they wish. Given the game's heavily competitive nature, these communications can potentially put children at risk of online abuse if their opponent is a particularly sore loser.

Advice for Parents & Educators

TRY IT OUT YOURSELF
As with many popular games, we'd recommend checking it out for yourself in advance if you have any concerns. In the case of Tekken 8, there's a free demo version available (for all platforms) which lets you experience fights with a handful of characters. A useful way of establishing first-hand whether some children might find the game's violence to be too intense.

EXERCISE YOUR JUDGEMENT
While Tekken 8 features a sort of 'spray' impact effect when attacks land, it's not the kind of game that most observers would describe as gory (unlike, for instance, the Mortal Kombat franchise). Of course, any fighting game worthy of the name will include a significant degree of violence – but the level at which the battles in Tekken are pitched may not be an issue for some children.

MARTIAL ARTS MOTIVATION?
With characters utilising real-world fighting styles such as Jiu-Jitsu, boxing and kickboxing, Tekken could represent an opportunity to channel a child's fondness for the game into a beneficial interest in real-world martial arts. Classes can help to build young people's confidence and physical fitness, as well as providing avenues for making new friends.

CONTROL COMMUNICATIONS
If a child plays Tekken online with anyone apart from their friends, then parents and carers could consider restricting communications – such as shutting off the facility to be messaged by other players (although the child's profile name will still be displayed) – to reduce the chance of contact from strangers. This can be done via the console's account settings or through the child's Steam account (if playing on PC).
